Seniors' Biases

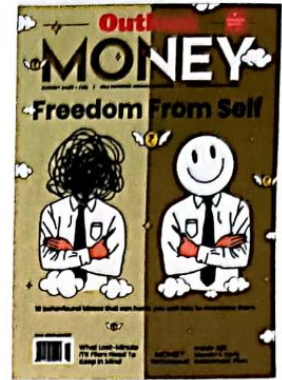
